A MESSAGE FROM SCADDING COURT COMMUNITY CENTRE

2018 saw a number of changes in our neighbourhood and organization. These have fundamentally affected the way SCCC plans to approach the future and the organization's role in ensuring we remain proactive and responsive to the needs and aspirations of the communities and city residents we serve.

This year, SCCC decided to highlight a very important theme in community building and city building: the importance of our elders, our youth, and planning how to bring the two groups together. Sharing stories, experiences and time, builds stronger communities—locally and across Toronto.

Unfortunately, 2018 saw an unprecedented number of gun-violence related deaths and shifting government priorities that have impacted elder care and support. For these reasons, SCCC led two important neighbourhood initiatives:

- #TOCares Anti-Gun-Violence Campaign
- Strengthening and better evaluating supports for our senior neighbours and members of the SCCC family.

Through arts initiatives and by partnering with other city leaders, SCCC was able to:

- Support the recognition of 68 #TOCares submissions through a special event
- Highlight the talent and resilience of our city by awarding 12 top prizes and an honourarium for every submission
- Work with leaders in their fields as allies on the #TOCares Campaign with support from many partners and sponsors

With our seniors' programs, SCCC has developed a better understanding of our own operations and how we can best support the health and ongoing development of diasporic, diverse communities that have made Toronto their home. It has not been easy, and it requires significant investment from participants, staff, and volunteers— but we believe we are on a path of change and able to provide a healthy and well-socialized, educational and supportive environment for both young people and seniors who choose SCCC as their place of comfort, recreation and support.

There are many other initiatives SCCC both led and supported in 2018 that deserve mention including valiant efforts to fight the cancellation of respite care; ongoing support for social entrepreneurship work; leadership around settlement issues and of course, how SCCC doubled our resolve to support the Alexandra Park community as it undergoes revitalization.

With the ongoing support of our strong Board, staff, volunteers, interns and community, we believe we will continue to advance and actualize the directions outlined in our new strategic plan.

We thank everyone who has helped the organization move forward; without our partners, sponsors, funders, elected officials and most importantly, our communities- because there are many- SCCC could not continue to be the place that so many people continue to be part of building into an asset that our city needs and benefits from.

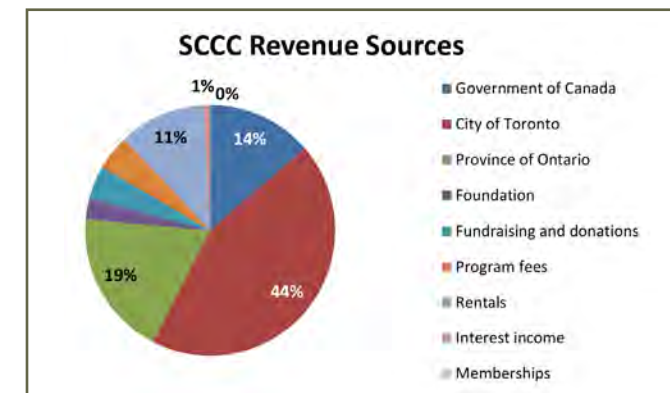

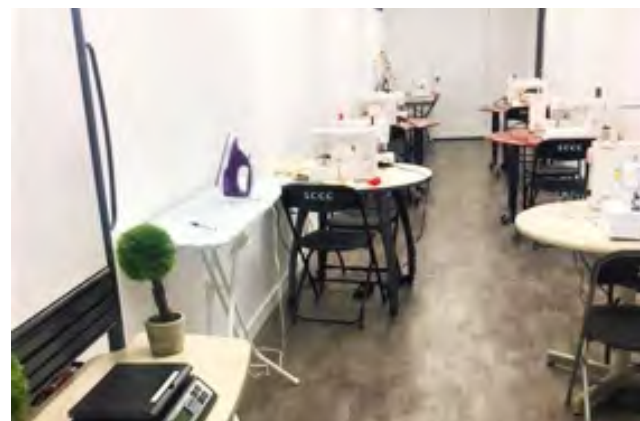

SCCC SEWING HUB

In 2018 we were excited to introduce a new edition to our retrofitted shipping container family: a sewing hub.

Launched in October, the Scadding Court Community Centre Sewing Hub is a space where sewing, sustainability and creativity meet. Many items that can be reused are thrown out every day. To help foster a culture of waste reduction, sharing, repairing and reusing, the City of Toronto worked with local agencies and non-profit organizations to deliver Community Reduce & Reuse Programs.



Scadding Court is proud to partner with the City to provide programming that focuses on waste reduction through sewing- a skill that will help to build sustainable communities and reduce the amount waste going to landfill by: educating residents about the importance of waste reduction and reuse, providing opportunities for sharing and repairing, offering skills training and creating job and economic opportunities and creating spaces for community members to gather.

A RENEWED FOCUS ON ALEXANDRA PARK

Scadding Court has renewed its connection with the Alexandra Park community and the Alexandra Park Community Centre (APCC). Strengthening our union is vital to best serve the residents in our neighbourhood and build our community together.

SCCC has been listening and responding to how we can best support the work of APCC in a healthy partnership. We have been assisting with writing grant applications and have shared staff resources to ensure event success.

We have also created some joint youth programs across the centres, including boxing, soccer, ball hockey, and homework club. Alexandra Park residents have also been attending the Women's Entrepreneurship Program, resulting in successful entrepreneur opportunities for residents.

We look forward to continuing our collaboration efforts and hope that the enhancement of the centres' relationship ultimately benefits the community at large.

SOCIAL ENTERPRISE, PARTNERSHIPS, EMERGING RELATIONSHIPS

SCCC prides itself on developing innovative initiatives that support the community and help to address a broad range of social and economic needs in the city. Over the years, we have used non-traditional approaches to ensure individuals facing multiple barriers, including racialized and low-income populations, newcomers, and women, have access to meaningful economic development opportunities, are able to exercise their leadership skills, and can make contributions to their communities and the city.



In 2018, SCCC partnered with Ryerson University's Diversity Institute to launch the Newcomer Entrepreneurship Hub (NEH) and the Women's Entrepreneurship Hub (WEH) - initiatives that provide holistic business development support for low-income newcomers and self-identifying women who are starting or want to grow their small business. To date, 85 participants have enrolled in these programs and are receiving access to entrepreneurial training, wrap-around supports, business coaching, and

mentorship, as well as unique opportunities to test their business ideas. Several program graduates have successfully launched their businesses out of SCCC's Market 707 and elsewhere across the city. We have already started a waitlist for enrollment in 2019, as demand for the program continues to grow.

As a way to further promote and create a more diverse entrepreneurial community in Toronto, SCCC partnered with the Waterfront Business Improvement Area (BIA) for a second year to co-host the Waterfront Artisan Market. We also partnered with Sidewalk Labs Toronto to host Market 307 where vendors from NEH and Market 707 had an opportunity to showcase their products at Open Sidewalks and Civic Tech Toronto meet ups. Vendors included Kanto, T&T Roti, Delightfully Delicious, Nil's Pocket Bakery, Gushi, and Jammy Dodger.



THE TORONTO CARES CAMPAIGN (#TOCares)

The tragic gun violence in our city raised many questions and #TOCares was our response to create a space for all Torontonians to have their voices heard. The people most impacted by this issue had been largely absent in being called on to help develop solutions.

SCCC and partners, in response to this situation, developed the #TOCares Campaign; an effort that aimed to create a platform and invite Torontonians from all walks of life to participate in the civic life of our city and craft meaningful responses to the violence we continue to see. We created a challenge to highlight the spirit and talent of our residents, and to challenge ourselves to highlight the best of our city with our collective message of anti-gun violence.

An Arts Exhibition and Awards Ceremony was held on October 27th, 2018 with the support of over 50 sponsors representing the private, government and public sectors. 68 artists participated and received tokens of appreciation for their dedication to the health, safety, resilience and love of our city and its residents.
